

Dutch Elm Disease

It has come to the attention of Cupar Town Council that we have 8 confirmed trees in Cupar that have Dutch Elm Disease. We are working quickly with the residents to ensure these trees are removed and disposed of properly as quick as possible.

If you see an Elm Tree in Cupar, on your property or someone else's that you think may have Dutch Elm Disease, please call the Town Office as soon as possible with the civic address of the tree.

It is very important that we address the trees that are affected quickly, in hopes to not have other trees in town affected.

Remember Elm trees cannot be pruned from April 1-Sept 1 of any year without obtaining a proper permit (infected trees <u>CAN BE</u> taken down during this time and dealt with and disposed of properly).

Dutch Elm Disease



Overview

Dutch Elm Disease (DED) is caused by fungus that attacks American elm (*Ulmus americana*), and sometimes Siberian elm (*Ulmus pumila*) trees. The fungus can be carried by elm bark beetles, contaminated pruning tools, or by the root systems of other infected elm trees. DED blocks the vascular system of the tree, causing it to die within a few years, sometimes within a few weeks. Since there are no known cures for infected trees, preventative measures must be taken.



Symptoms

Early symptoms include sections of wilted green leaves, that eventually turn yellow, dry up and fall off the tree.

Another way to ascertain if a tree is infected is to remove a branch and strip off the bark—on infected trees dark brown streaking can be seen on the sapwood.

Stop Dutch Elm Disease now!

With the series of trees provide a broad array of well-known environmental, economic, and social benefits that include sequestering of CO₂ and pollutants, shade and cooling, noise buffering, wildlife habitat, increased property values and psychological well being. Don't let Dutch Elm Disease decrease the value of your urban forest! There are ways to treat and prevent the disease.

Did You Know?

- Pruning elm trees is prohibited between April 1 and August 31 without a permit
- Storage and transportation of elm firewood is prohibited without a permit
- After an elm tree has been removed, the stump must either be removed or treated
- After an elm tree has been removed, it must be disposed of in a designated elm tree disposal site

Forsite Treatment Management

Forsite coordinates and facilitates infected tree management by assisting interested municipalities throughout the province to survey elm trees in their area in order to slow the spread of DED via targeted treatments.

We perform detailed tree inventories of every elm in a municipality, from which we create a map layer using GIS that show s the exact (GPS) location of each tree. This inventory provides the basis for a municipal monitoring program to assist in managing shade trees and possible elm replacements in urban areas.

Treatment Options

Fungicide Injections

A fungicide is injected directly into the base of the tree. It is most commonly used in high-value elms, since it is one of the more expensive treatment options.

Tanglefoot Tree Band

Although these are mainly used for the control of cankerworms, other insects weaken the trees they attack. When a tree is weakened, it becomes more susceptible to other diseases, such as DED.

Insecticide Spray

An insecticide containing the ingredient "chlorpyrifos" is sprayed on the lower 25cm of the tree. This prevents the beetles from overwintering for up to two years.


